Preambulatory Clauses: Provide an overview of the problem and remind member states of past actions.

Examples:

Operative Clauses: Contain the real content and action of a resolution. They are meant to achieve the policy goals of the delegates. Each clause has one idea, although sub-clauses must be used to further detail the main point of the operatives.
